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OVERVIEW

Sankofa Community Development Corporation (Sankofa) hosted a community meeting to envision the development of Wetland Park and Nature Trail in the Lower Nineth Ward. First, participants learned about the history of the Wetland Park and current plans to activate the full 40-acre area adjacent to the Bayou Bienvenue Triangle. Participants were then engaged in interactive activities to explore programming that would support full use of the site. The engagement process led to a shared understanding of preferred community options for relaxation, environmental education, economic development, and recreation for all to enjoy.

The aim of this engagement is to facilitate the co-creation of a vision that brings together the best ideas and resources for the Wetland Park that will connect residents and small businesses to outdoor recreation, STEM education, and green infrastructure job training. Based on stakeholder input, Sankofa will finalize an implementation plan that will aide in site planning, program prioritization, and will serve as a base line for fundraising efforts to underwrite the completion of the Wetland Park.

Meeting Summary

The community meeting was held on Thursday, July 8, 2021, from 5:30-7:30 p.m. In total, nearly 50 community stakeholders were in attendance.

After a brief round of introductions, Rashida Ferdinand, Executive Director of Sankofa presented an overview of the organization inclusive of its history, mission, vision, and health-centered community and economic development program areas.

HISTORY

The following development timeline of the Wetland Park was presented. It was noted in 2008, the first seed was planted to create the Wetland Park by Lower Ninth Ward residents.

Development Timeline

2008

THE VISION: Initiated by Steve Ringo to develop Bayou Bienvenue and Florida Avenue Corridor with Lower Ninth Ward residents

2015

THE ASK: Request to develop pilot project on 2-acre site of Florida Ave between Dubreuil to Delery Streets

2017

THE AWARD: S&WB Green Infrastructure programs awards planning and implementation grant to Sankofa CDC to execute 2-acre pilot project from Dubreuil to Delery Streets. Sankofa CDC receives City of New Orleans Concessions Agreement for project construction

2019

THE PARTNERS: Engaged with the Lower Ninth Ward community members Drs John Day & Gary Shaffer, and National Park Service -RTCP to develop master plan for expansion to 40-acre wetland park master plan.

2020

THE PLAN: Developed 6 additional acres with community programming. Partnered with the City DPW- Environmental Affairs office and Deep South Center for Environmental Justice to remove illegally dumped waste from site. Worked with Lower Ninth Ward community members and City Depts of Sanitation and Code Enforcement to remove 2,200 invasive trees and over 45 tons of debris from Florida Ave

2021

THE CEA: City of New Orleans executes 20-year Cooperative Endeavor Agreement with Sankofa CDC to develop and maintain the 40-acre Wetland Park project.

THE OPPORTUNITIES

The following opportunities are identified as the highest impact and best uses for the Wetland Park:



WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT: Green Jobs & Green Infrastructure

Promoting a workforce development pipeline of green infrastructure jobs supported by skills training and job retention programming.

This opportunity is inclusive of groundskeeping, horticulture, gardening, marsh restoration, plant and lawn specialization and more. These jobs, related skills and infrastructure development are growing in demand as the City launches new green infrastructure initiatives.



ECONOMIC IMPACT: Filling the Gap

Levering investments in green infrastructure to circulate funds in the local economy to bolster housing development, small business development and ecotourism.

This opportunity will increase the number of housing units, commercial storefronts, and visitors with spending power in the neighborhood.



RESILIENCY PLANNING: Comprehensive Recovery OpportunitiesDeveloping green infrastructure that links resilience to community development.

This opportunity will reduce the risk of flooding and increases the community's ability to recover.

PROGRAMMING & DESIGN

CURRENT STATUS

Wetland Park Director, Tricia LeBlanc provided an overview of the current and planned highlights of the Wetland Park. She noted 400 invasive Chinese Tallow trees were removed and replaced with over 300 Bald Cypress and 200 herbaceous trees. This has allowed over 81,000 gallons of water to flow into the area and support a habitat for many types of plants, butterflies, birds and other wildlife.





FUTURE EXPANSION

The development of the 40 acres of land presents the opportunity for students, local residents, and visitors to enjoy walking, jogging, canoeing, and other physical activities in a nature setting.



Opportunities for Community Usage at the Wetland Park



Next, participants envisioned special event spaces, rest areas and the opportunity to kayak, bike and canoe. Lastly health and exercise programming were also noted.






Opportunities for Youth Education at the Wetland Park

Overwhelming when asked to identify what opportunities could support children and youth education, participants prioritized uses of the Park that facilitate scouting activities and school field trips for grades K-12. Next, participants envisioned educational programming that promotes nature play and fishing. Lastly walking trails, nature walks, environmental education, STEM learning, job training and camping were also noted.




Opportunities for Economic Development Impact at the Wetland Park

Overwhelming when asked to identify what opportunities could promote economic development at the Park, participants prioritized water retention uses and corridor improvements. Next, participants ranked green jobs, green job training, fund development and small business partnerships. Lastly, eco-tourism, trailways and area beautification was also validated.
